FROM THE CHAPLAIN

YO MAMBA!

Deliver me, O LORD... they gathered together for war. They have sharpened their tongues like a serpent; adders' poison is under their lips. Selah. Psalm 140:1-3

Every former missionary ought to have at least one good snake story in his portfolio. One desperate missionary told about an alleged occurrence that took place in his village. It seems that he was in a hut visiting with a couple of men when things outside became strangely silent. The two villagers went out to investigate but never returned. After a considerable wait, the concerned missionary went outside and stood face-to-face with an enormous anaconda. He quickly climbed the nearest tree as the snake pursued fast on his heels. The suspense was building as the missionary horrified his listeners by saying that the snake took hold of his foot; then concluded his story by saying, "And that snake began to pull on my leg, just like I'm pulling on yours!" Well, you will not have to pull anybody's leg for a good snake story if you have lived in Southern Africa for any length of time! After spending thirty years in East Africa's Zululand, and Bophuthatswana under the Kalahari, we have seen plenty of characters for the plot; rinkhals (spitting cobra), puff adder, boomslang (tree snake), green mamba, and the greatly feared black mamba. Not only did we see a host of snakes in Africa, but memories took me back to my days of service in Vietnam. It has been reported that there are more than forty species of poisonous snakes over there. Once, during an operation in a mountainous region of the Ho Chi Minh Trail, our 'point man' severed the head of a Malayan Pit Viper with his machete. We took great care to point out the enormous head of the viper, that was still moving, to the Marine behind us, as each grunt maneuvered around this potential danger on the trail. Snakes are dangerous!

It is quite interesting to note that God often compares the potential dangers associated with the human tongue, to the poison that is found in these snakes. The tongue is perhaps the most dangerous of all. It can also kill, and we have ready access to this weapon that has the ability to assassinate someone's character or destroy someone's life! I am not for gun control, but I am for heart control which is necessary for tongue control. "But the tongue can no man tame; it is an unruly evil, full of deadly poison." "O generation of vipers... for out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh." Only God can tame the human tongue. Have you ever said something in haste and wished you could take it back? While attending junior high school, I could out-cuss any sailor in the Seventh Fleet, and my verbal eloquence cost me a ride on the school bus for the remainder of the school year. Perhaps it was a bad choice of words that could have been misunderstood. After studying the Zulu language for several months at Pietermaritzburg University Language Lab, Natal, it was time to put into practice my new skills. Instead of saying to the women, "watch the children," it came out, "cook the children." Everyone freaked out, especially the kids! On another occasion, a warning was sounded that a cobra was among the rocks during a funeral. I shouted, "yo mamba!" One guy thought I said, "yo mama!" "...they gathered together for war." For a moment, it was stand and fight, or take my flight.

John Phillips tells the following: "Backbiters murdered David Livingstone's wife... they were never brought into court for it, for where is the human court which could convict a person of murder on the ground of gossip? Mary Livingstone was never strong enough to be the constant companion of a pioneer. For years she struggled through the African bush, surrounded by hardships... with little children hanging on her skirt she could struggle on no more. She gave up and stayed home with her little ones to pray for her husband as he continued valiantly on. Then the gossips at the white settlements got busy. Why would a man want to leave his wife and plunge into the interior save the desire to be as far from her as possible? Hearing the scandal that was being bandied about, Livingstone sent for his wife. She came, but the unhealthy climate of the river country with its fevers and malaria proved too much for her, and she died after being reunited with her beloved David for only three months. 'Oh, my Mary, my Mary,' wept the brokenhearted man at her lonely graveside; but the gossips at the coast did not hear that. They had done their deadly work months before. God heard the desolate cry of His servant however, and He gathered up those tears and put them in His bottle to await the Judgment Day."

Remember the women! One of the toughest and least recognized jobs in the world is that of a Marine's wife! Many have deserved 'Purple Hearts' for wounds inflicted by hardships and careless words; and 'Medals of Honor' for their unwavering display of courage under fire, while their Marines are on deployment. The battles that have been fought on the home front are at times 'total assault' skirmishes on a family's emotional, financial, and parenting defenses. God bless them all and give to each an abundance of His wisdom, grace, strength, and courage. The men are a little different, we just say, "put up or shut up!"




